

Questions to Ask:

- Which doctor will I see at my appointment?
- Which doctor will be performing my surgery (in offices where there are multiple doctors)?
- How easy will it be to speak to the doctor during and after treatment?
- Who will follow me for my eye and systemic problems in the future?

Also remember to ask

- What are the standard treatment options?
- Is the proposed treatment investigational or experimental? If so, how many patients have been treated and how long have they been followed

for recurrent disease?
Is this treatment approved by the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or CE?

- The doctor should explain the risks and benefits of the proposed treatment.
- Ask how often, where, and by whom you will be followed up with after treatment.

FAQ's

Q: Should I get a second opinion?

A: Second opinions are great when all your doctors say the same thing. Unfortunately, differing opinions can make things even more confusing. If you get a second different opinion

and are confused, you can call Dr. Finger (to ask questions) or even consider getting a third opinion.

Q: How do I pick a doctor?

A: You should pick a doctor who has experience caring for eye cancer patients and with whom you are comfortable.

- You should be able to ask questions about your case and feel comfortable that treatment decisions are not only based on available science but take into account your personal situation and medical problems.

- Since you may need to see your doctors for many years, consider that it is easier to be treated and followed with a doctor in your area or country.
